# What to Expect

Robin Hood is a play, a play is performed live on stage by actors pretending to be characters. This play has six actors. Sometimes these actors multi-role. Multi-roling is where an actor plays more than one character. This play is 2 hours including a 20 minute break.







This is the stage. There are platforms representing the trees of the forest. There is also metal chain hanging on the back wall.

There is lots of climbing in the show but don't worry, the actors are trained and completely safe.

There are lots of fight scenes in the show so its important to remember that the cast are just pretending.

## What to Expect



There is live singing and sound effects in the show. It might be very loud at points but not for very long.



There are lots of special effects in the show, including haze, projection and lights. (Haze is like smoke and will make the stage appear misty.)



There are lots of different lighting effects in the show. The stage might change to all one colour or it might be very dark but not for very long.





#### Robin

This is Robin, he has recently run away from home and is a little out of his comfort zone. He wears matching camo shorts and shirt and a green vest (He sometimes wears a hood too.) He isn't a member of the merry band to begin with.

#### Marian

This character is head strong and tough and is a member of the merry band that lives out in Sherwood forest. She wears a short-sleeved camo jumpsuit and a brown vest.



#### John

John is a member of the merry band, living off the land in Sherwood. He's loyal to his friends but distrustful of strangers. He wears beige overalls, a green and brown fleece and a bucket hat.

#### Much

Much is another member of the merry band in Sherwood. They can be quite timid when trying new things and are prone to getting captured! They wear dark shorts and tshirt and a knitted vest.





#### **The Sheriff**

The Sheriff is powerhungry and loves collecting your taxes. He wears a dark red suit with tassels, a red shirt and a red cowboy hat. He sometimes even wears a cape made out of money!

#### **The Castle Guards**

These henchmen aren't too bright but can cause a real problem for our heroes. They wear a diamond patterned red over-shirt and a chainmail head dress. The Guards are played by members of the merry band.



#### The King

In our production we have two performers playing the King, so you may be graced by the presence of the King on the right or the King on the left (whichever one you get will stay the same for the whole performance.) The King wears a sparkly black suit and a huge silver crown. The merry band think the King has come to save the day but all is not as it seems.



#### **The Villager**

This character is played by the same actor as the Sheriff. They appear in the story to represent the villagers our merry band are helping. The Villager wears a pink cloak and hood with different coloured shoes.

### Important Props



#### The Tax Collector's Cart

This is used by the Sheriff and the Guards and is used to collect up all the taxes in the land.



The Stag Rucksack which is butchered.



**The Bushes** This rucksack is used to These bushes are used as represent a dead stag disguises. They also make fantastic sounds





Our story opens in Sherwood Forest with the merry band. Much places a bush which starts to make a sound.



Much, John and Marian erupt into the opening song, 'Its a lovely day to go walking in the forest.'





Robin appears at the top of a tree during the song, then swiftly disappears again.



Much and John stalk and shoot a deer (played by Marian) but flee when they hear someone coming.





The Sheriff enters and finds the dead stag (killing a stag is a crime in Sherwood Forest)



The Sheriff runs into Robin and blames him for shooting the stag, trying to capture him.





Its looking like it's all over for our hero before the story's even begun!



The merry band of Marian, Much and John appear with their bows and arrows and scare the Sheriff off.

Before they can let him into the group, Robin has to fight John to prove himself.



Now part of the merry band, Robin settles down with them for the night but becomes very squeamish when they show him how to butcher the stag.

Before bed, the gang have a song and dance, A villager joins in too.



The Sheriff enters with his tax collecting cart. He asks the audience how much money they've got so he can tax it.

The Sheriff steals a member of the audience's belongings and gives it to a guard, who takes over the tax collecting.



The guard spots Robin up in the trees and knowing he's a criminal, tries to arrest him. The gang come to the rescue, shooting the guard with an arrow and scaring them off!





The gang now have all the taxes collected by the Sheriff and argue about what to do with it.



The guard returns to the castle and tells the Sheriff he's lost all the money. The Sheriff is furious and sets off to find Robin.





The Sheriff finds them and fights them in Sherwood forest.



The Sheriff manages to capture Much and takes them back to the castle to be executed.





While Much is imprisoned the rest of the gang decide to cause more chaos by stealing from the rich and giving to the poor.



Whilst this is going on, the Sheriff is informed that the King has landed in Dover.



# **The Story**

We return to the Sheriff tax collecting and assuring us that even though the King is on his way back, he is still in charge.




Below the Sheriff are three guards with three buckets labelled sick, poor and sheriff. The audience decides how the taxes are spent (but the Sheriff gets it all anyway.)



We see Much, alone in their cell, singing a song of Sherwood Forest.




The gang hatch a plan to rescue Much. Robin is going to sneak into the castle while Marian and John protect the villagers.



Much, scared and alone and with no friends in sight, prepares to be executed. Robin arrives to save Much. There's a chase but eventually both Much and Robin are captured.



Suddenly, a mysterious figure appears in the castle. Its the grand arrival of the King!



Robin pleads with the King, telling him all about the Sheriff's wrong doings.



Turns out the King isn't much of a saviour after all and orders the guards to go ahead with the execution. Just before the swords fall, Robin and Much manage to escape!





Robin and Much return to their friends and hatch a plan to overthrow the King.




Meanwhile the King and the Sheriff search high and low for the merry band.





We then see a montage of the King on the hunt for the merry band. This section contains loud sound effects, haze and projection.



The King forces the Sheriff to sing a song while they launch cannonballs into Sherwood Forest.





The merry band are finally captured and ready to be executed.



However, with the help of the audience (who will be howling like wolves) they are able to escape execution and confront the King.



With no guards left, the King is forced to surrender. The merry band decides to share the King's power with the people and let them decide their future.



Equal at last, everyone sings one last song, bringing this play to a close.
